# LIZN'BOW: Ninalandia Skycoaster

VR Roller-Coaster Ride Through a Mixed Reality Multiverse of a queer-futurist post-apocalyptic version of Miami

[Miami, FL] Locust Projects presents *Niñalandia Skycoaster* a multimedia experience by Miami-based artists LIZN'BOW opening in the Project Room on Saturday, September 7, 2024 | 6-8pm and a performance by the artists at 8pm.

The artists invite visitors to step into an immersive multimedia experience and embark on a VR rollercoaster ride based on the artists' *Niñalandia Mixed Reality Multiverse*, a queer-futurist post-apocalyptic version of Miami which brings together ideas from their nearly decade long collaboration.

Liz and Bow's personal car, a 2006 Buick Rendezvous custom-wrapped in a hyper-maximalist digital collage becomes the participants roller coaster cart. Once inside they are transported into a virtual theme park experience. The immersive gallery installation also features projected animations and a sound score, creating an environment where physical and digital realms unite.

Visitors zoom past iconic elements from Niñalandia, such as a jet-ski unicorn cow, a mountain of burning money, and giant leche jugs, all submerged halfway underwater and set against neon rainbows in undulating pink and purple skies. By presenting queer-coded imagery through nostalgic digital aesthetics reminiscent of early-internet games like RollerCoaster Tycoon and Mario Kart, *Niñalanida Skycoaster* encourages expansive approaches to familiar forms of entertainment, promoting a more inclusive worldview.

With the support of Locust Projects, *Niñalanida Skycoaster* aligns with contemporary trends in art and technology that prioritize interactivity and accessibility. This project is not just a display but a platform for discourse, challenging traditional exhibition norms and inviting conversation within the vibrant context of Miami-inspired iconography.

*Niñalandia Skycoaster* was a "Curator's Pick" selected by Executive Director Lorie Mertes from the artists' applications to open calls in 2023 and 2024 for both the Digital Commission and Project Room.

### **ABOUT THE ARTISTS**

Liz Ferrer and Bow Ty's work spans various mediums including digital art, tech, sculpture, music, video, and performance art. Through a queer and comedic lens, their work together has been building a reputation for critiquing American and Latin pop. Their most recent projects together are femme reggaeton band Niña and new media collaborative LIZN'BOW.

Niña is a feminist reggaeton duo featuring Liz and Bow, they started this body of work to bring diverse voices to the traditionally male genre of reggaeton. LIZN'BOW is a new media body of work in which they use media technology, digital tools, and community building

exercises as vehicles to visualize, play, and explore different social and creative possibilities.
