TJ Ahearn

TJ Ahearn's collages are created through a meticulous application of hand-cut imagery from both vintage and contemporary periodicals, books and other printed matter, which is glued onto the back of LP jackets. Most of the albums used date back to the 60s and 70s, and the original vinyl is included with the collaged piece. Ahearn creates imaginary environments through the inventive layering and juxtaposition of both banal and pop culture visual elements. The collages on view are from the artist's ongoing JUKEBOX series. TJ Ahearn lives and works between NYC and Miami. Ahearn attended School of Visual Arts in New York as well as both the University of Miami BFA Program and Miami Dade South Campus Fine Arts Program and Psychopolis Academy in the Netherlands. The work of TJ Ahearn is in many prestigious collections in the U.S. and abroad and has been exhibited at museums, galleries and art fairs internationally.



Paul Amundarain


Multiple Realities, 2019

When we read the union of these two words "Multiple Realities" the first things that come to our minds are physical theories and parallel dimensions. An interesting topic to go depth. But I'm not bringing these words to develop extreme theories. I use the concept of Multiple Realities to understand our physical realities, of which we are participants day by day in our natural context as humans who coexist in the same physical space and time. Reality is defined as everything that is real. It is all that possesses qualities and characteristics that make it exist. From this idea, the question arises. How could we define our own reality and the path through it that allows us, in some cases, to change our states, conditions or circumstances? We have the power as human beings to change our position and perspective.

Paul Amundarain (n. 1985) belongs to a generation that received the legacy of the grid – a form that allowed modernity to be structured – already deconstructed. As a newcomer to the United States, his work contains a biographical and aesthetic record of the pursuit of paradise that is often fulfilled in enclosed horizons. At the same time, he has learned the lessons of survival that in depressed neighborhoods make it possible to manufacture necessary objects with materials discarded by other social sectors. Trash is recycled as art.




Natalia Benedetti

Her work has previously been shown at MOCA's Joan Lehman Building in North Miami in the group exhibitions Making Art in Miami: Travels in Hyperreality (2000), The House at MOCA (2001) and MOCA and Miami (2005).

Geddes Levenson and Annie Blazejack grew up together in Miami, FL. For most of their lives, their friendship and art-making practices have grown side by side. While in grad school, the two decided to create all their work collaboratively, sharing authorship of everything they make. Often they paint on the same canvas. They also paint 'conversations,' taking turns adding images to a series of interrelated paintings. They translate ideas from paintings into other mediums like videos, cyanotype prints, textile installations, ceramic sculptures, or performances.



Johanna Boccardo

Johanna Boccardo is a Miami-based Venezuelan artist with an ample creative career that includes editorial illustration, product design and fine arts. A graduate of the Ringling School of Art, she has lived and worked in Barcelona, Miami and Venezuela. Through the masterful use of different media, Boccardo explores the application and interaction of color sequences to develop abstract ideas and concepts at various levels of non-literal meaning. In her work on paper, she uses advanced color theory to deepen the effects of emotionally charged chromatic results, often by using complex layers of geometry, color and texture.

Venus of the North is a reconfiguration of iconic images from art history and popular culture / the Venus of Willendorf and Santa merged into one absurdity playing with the idea of gender, fertility and mythology. The work is cast in bronze in the ancient lost wax process, and is finished in a one of a kind patina.



Randy Burman

From the Shibui Boxes series. As its name indicates in Japanese and as understood by the western world as that subtle balance between complexity and simplicity. One of the most beautiful is a kind of visual haiku: Bridge of 100 Matchsticks, in one of many allegories recalls that when one moves with determination, "burned bridges light the final path." Originally created as part of a series for an exhibition curated by Ruben Torres-Llorca at Juan Ruiz Gallery.

I have a serious preoccupation with the intuitive aspects of art making. There is an internal dichotomy that drives my creative process on several levels: I'm compelled to make serious statements, but find myself subverting that goal with irreverent humor. Precise execution is integral, yet playful strategies are often a point of departure. Though I toggle between these parts of my practice, the recurring result is work that engages the alchemy of juxtaposed elements, meanings and scale. Though the execution is very exact, the starting point is often circumstantial. Placing found objects next to each other might act as the beginning of a piece. Other times work comes out of the leftover materials from separate projects or the appropriation of visual material from a swathe of sources. The resulting sculptures, installations, paintings and print media explore themes of metaphysical confrontation and identity while often encouraging dynamic interaction with the audience.



Christopher Byrd

The paintings of Chris Byrd explore ideas of Identity, the creation of Meaning and the search Truth that come about through the contemplation of the self-existing in the contemporary world. Bringing together ideas from the history of Abstraction yet made current by the systemization of Arts formal language of line, color and form, rendered in a graphic, hard-edged presentation that eludes to the omnipresent language of design and advertising, at once making the work Classical and Contemporary. He holds a Master of Fine Arts from American University in Washington, DC and a Bachelor of Fine Arts from the Atlanta College of Art in Atlanta, Georgia. The artist lives and works in Miami, Florida.



Within a year, I made the move to lead photographer in my own photography company and had my work featured in fashion magazines, catalogs, calendars and recently a cookbook. My fine art photographs have been featured in Florida and Georgia galleries. I also design websites for my clients. Interior designers commission me to create fine art photographs for residences and businesses. I currently reside in South Florida and continue to work in all areas of photography.

This artwork is part of a new series of paintings that I started to create last year. I call them Accumulation series. They are very rich in texture and color. The surface is very shine and glossy. I used mixed media techniques applied in several layers and accumulation of different materials to create a tactile experience. These artworks can be perceived as reliefs or as paintings. It's connected with the sculptures made with assemblages of car's parts by John Chamberlain. The point in this body of works is not that painting and sculpture are intimately linked, but that painting and sculpture exist only in relationship to the viewer. I use different materials to provoke optical effects and tactile sensations. These pieces don't have a real space and there is not a center focus. Each part of one same work of art is strong enough and different from the rest. I explore the unity in the diversity of elements used.



John DeFaro

John DeFaro is a multidisciplinary visual artist and designer. John's work as a visual artist was first influenced as a youth in an apprentice type of mode from his one-on-one connections with numerous renowned artists who were neighbors in the Hamptons, NY. From age 25-27 John worked as an assistant in Southampton for Henry Geldzahler, the noted curator, critic and public official whose enthusiastic advocacy of contemporary art made his name synonymous with the art scene in NYC for three decades, in the 60's through the 80's. In 1991 John then began sketching new ideas for early American furniture, which led him to his next venture. At the age of 29 John created original home furnishing designs for Lexington Home Brands in Thomasville, NC. In recent years his work has moved in new directions in installation, drawing and painting that return him to his initial impulses focused on the environment, nature and found materials. From 2015-2017 John served as the Executive Assistant for Tigertail Productions. He is also a recipient of two Miami-Dade County Department of Cultural Affairs Artist Access grants. Most recent John became the assistant to art conservator Viviana Dominguez, owner and founder of Art Conservators Lab, LLC in Miami and Artistic Director for Books & Books in Coconut Grove.

Cara Despain was born in Salt Lake City, Utah and currently lives and works in Miami, Florida. She holds a B.F.A. from the University of Utah (2006). In 2012, she was selected for the Salt Lake City Mayor's Award in the visual arts, and in 2016 she was selected for the South Florida Consortium Fellowship. Recent exhibitions include Autobody in Buenos Aires, Argentina, Locally Sourced at the American University Museum in Washington D.C.; Voces Feroces in Santiago, Chile; open sesame at The Lumber Room, Portland, Oregon; and Seeing the Stone solo exhibition at Contemporary Utah Art Center in Salt Lake City. In Miami recent exhibitions include Fantastical Vizcaya at Vizcaya Museum and Gardens, Slow Burn solo exhibition at Spinello Projects, and No Man's Land at Rubell Family Collection. In 2014 she was the Art Director for the feature length film The Strongest Man that premiered at the Sundance Film Festival in 2015. She is also a founding board member of the Davey Foundation, a grant-giving foundation that gives grants to emerging filmmakers and playwrights.













The inspiration for this series is the very contemporary concern regarding privacy in today's technological arena. With Internet browsing history, emails or other activity available to individuals, governments or corporations, Diaz examines this issue from his very personal perspective of one who understands the importance of privacy and confidentiality. His doctor-patient relationships are bound by the 5th century Hyppocratic Oath, which keeps patient's personal information secret.

Gianna DiBartolomeo is a mixed-media artist born and raised in Miami, Florida. Gianna earned her Master of Fine Arts program at Florida International University, where she previously obtained her Bachelors Fine Arts. Gianna was a Florida International University Ratcliffe Art + Design Incubator Fellow and participating artist for Vizcaya Museum and Gardens CAP Lab. Locally, Gianna's work has been exhibited during Aqua Art Fair during Art Basel Miami Beach, in the historic Moore Building in Miami's Design District, at Vizcaya Museum and Gardens, on a Venetian Post In front of Mercedes-Benz of Coral Gables, and in various group and solo exhibitions. Gianna also has shown in various exhibitions in New York, Chicago, Seattle, Las Vegas, Toronto, and Spain. Charity also plays a role in Gianna's work. She believes in the importance of giving back and has donated artwork to numerous charities and fundraising events and enjoys volunteering her time as a visiting artist to local schools and organizations.

Lush in texture and dynamic in line, Liv Dockerty's paintings convey a feeling of movement and life. Born in 1992 in Miami, Liv Dockerty is an American contemporary abstract painter. Her artistic process began as a child and developed much throughout her life. She was born into a family of contemporary art collectors and now her primary source of inspiration hails from the world around her, mainly the sky and music. Liv studied art and design at the Parsons New School for Design in New York City where she received her Bachelors of Fine Arts. Her art is characterized by contrasting depths and vibrant colors, which give way to bold compositions. Colors push against one another, swirling and gathering to create a sense of dimension and form. Though abstract in composition, Dockerty's paintings are rich in content. Their associative titles, often referencing song lyrics, evoke narratives and emotions, while her bold palette invites the viewer to indulge in the sensual pleasure of colors artfully combined.



Ewan Eason

Mappa Mundi Santa Ana Giclee print. Edition 1 of 80

Ewan's Mappa Mundi series – the title of which comes from the Medieval Latin Mappa, meaning sheet, and Mundi, of the world – has taken inspiration from the study of maps from ancient to modern. A particular reference point is Charles Booth's 19th century 'Poverty Maps' which set out to define levels of poverty or wealth in London, street by street, using a colour coded system. Ewan's stripping away of words and traditional symbolism echoes Booth's work, with the solid colour blocks becoming abstract images in themselves. However, rather than defining the landscape as poor, middle class or rich, Ewan's use of gold, with its sacred and precious quality, instead draws on the egalitarian nature of people.

Since 2010 London based artist Ewan David Eason has created abstract images from reality, drawing particular inspiration from organic and man-made patterns created in cartography. By gilding with precious metals or using complimentary colours he aims to focus the viewer on the sacredness and diversity of our living landscapes. High levels of accuracy and dedication are used in the construction of the artworks, emphasizing their status as a method of art-as-documentation.



Fuenmayor has exhibited in numerous solo and group shows in USA, Latin America and Europe; his work was recently showcased in The Florida Prize 2018, Orlando Museum of Art, Orlando, a solo exhibition "Tropical Mythologies" at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston in 2015, "Caribbean Crossroads" Exhibition at the Queens Museum, NY, as well as recent solo shows at Dot Fiftyone Gallery and El Museo Gallery in Bogotá in 2018. In 2019 he will be resident at The South Florida Art Center where he will be working on two upcoming solo shows at Dolby Chadwick Gallery in San Francisco, CA and Fernando Pradilla Gallery in Madrid, Spain. He currently lives and works in Miami, FL and is represented by Dot Fiftyone Gallery, Miami and Dolby Chadwick Gallery, San Francisco and El Museo Gallery in Bogotá, Colombia.

Francie Bishop Good's objects are extremely alluring. They are sometimes fluorescent, calling you toward them like bright underwater corals, breathing with oceanic phosphorescence. They are earthy and extraterrestrial at the same time. They are full of manual labor, but they are also the spark of something inside, the roadways of the intangible mind. Francie Bishop Good was raised in Allentown, Pennsylvania. She currently lives and works in South Florida and New York City. Her work has been exhibited nationally and internationally. Bishop Good is twice recipient of the South Florida Cultural Consortium Fellowship, and the State of Florida Individual Artist Fellowship. Her museum solo shows include the Allentown Art Museum, Allentown, PA, Museum of Art, Fort Lauderdale, FL, the Museum of Contemporary Art, Jacksonville, FL, Art and Culture Center / Hollywood, FL, and the Hilliard Museum, Lafayette, LA.



Alejandra Gotera

Alejandra Gotera was born in Maracaibo, Venezuela in 1994. She started her journey in the arts at the age of 9, having always been interested in the extraordinary and what could be she dived head first in surrealism and later on fell in love with abstraction. As she grew older and with the help of her family she decided to attend the University of South Florida in Tampa where she attained her Bachelors in Fine Arts degree in Studio Art with focus on Painting. By graduation Alejandra was looking at the work of artist like Helen Frankenthaler, Katharina Grosse, Jackie Soccacio and Heather Day; her own work dealing with themes such as chaos and control, it was about letting the medium run free rather than trying to shape it to her will. Recent years however, have brought abrupt changes in the artist's practice. Due to the ever growing political unrest going on in Venezuela, Alejandra finds herself an alien dependent of the good will of a country with questionable approach to immigration laws. There is a constant feeling of unrest in the artist's life which can be clearly seen in her recent work. Rather than letting the medium do its thing, Alejandra now looks more for stability rather than spontaneity. She now aims to communicate her journey and the constant struggle to achieve balance among the chaos. Lines now become path to different outcomes, and each painting turns into new worlds full of possibilities almost daring the viewers to find their own path within.



Susan Graham

Much of my work over the last few years has had to do with insomnia or with the fears (of guns, of tornadoes, of isolation) which contribute to insomniac musings. The condition of insomnia is in opposition to the state of dreaming—or insomnia at least precludes dreaming—yet the outcome of prolonged lack of sleep is a dreamlike state. My sculptures and installations use repetitive acts or actions (often resulting in the making of a multitude of similar objects) and images and linking them to a particular psychological state.

Susan Smith Graham has worked in several areas of the visual arts, including oil painting, printmaking, and sculpture. Her primary focus at this point is abstract expressionistic painting using acrylics. In this medium she can explore and expand her strong interest in the interplay and mutual reinforcement of color, light and free form. Her paintings provoke a strong interaction between the intent and imagination of the artist, relative to that of the observer.



Moira Holohan received her BA at Bard College, NY and her MFA at Hunter College, NY. She has shown nationally and internationally including New York: Regina Rex, Steuben Gallery (Pratt Institute) and AC Institute; and Miami: Fringe Projects, Miami-Dade College Museum of Art+Design, Perez Art Museum Miami, Frost Art Museum, Emerson Dorsch Gallery, David Castillo Gallery, MoCA North Miami, De La Cruz Collection, Deering Estate, Dimensions Variable and General Practice. Holohan was the co-founder of meetinghouse in downtown Miami and was the Director of Art from 2016 - 2018. In 2019 she had solo exhibitions at the Arts Annex in Castine, ME and The Miami Beach Botanical Garden.

Cuny Janssen (NL 1975) completed her studies at the Academy of Fine Arts in Utrecht followed by an internship with Thomas Struth in Düsseldorf, Germany. Since 2000 Janssen travelled around the world to make portraits of children in their everyday environments, combining these with photographs of the landscape they are surrounded by. So far Janssen photographs exclusively in color and manages to capture impulsive moments with an analogue 4 x 5 inch plate camera, which seems like a contradiction. Her photos create a profoundly expressive work about a city or a region and their people. Her travels resulted in several photo books such as India (2002), Portrait/Landscape Macedonia (2004), Finding Thoughts (2005), There is Something in the Air (2007), Amami (2009), My Grandma Was a Turtle (2010), Yoshino (2013) and BLU (2015). Cuny Janssen was nominated for the Prix de Rome for Photography in 2002 and had solo exhibitions at the Photographers' Gallery in London, Photography Museum Amsterdam (FOAM), Museum de Pont in Tilburg and Kunstverein Heilbronn. She's represented by andriesse eyck galerie in Amsterdam who will launch her new book There Was a Child Went Forth. Their beauty made the American photographer and writer Robert Adams include one of Janssen's photographs in his newest publication Art Can Help: Selected Essays and Notes, Yale University. Cuny Janssen lives and works in Amsterdam.

This piece, entitled "Shotgun" (in reference to the subject riding 'shotgun' as the place in the front seat, or in this case a bike, is colloquially referred.) I shot this image manually in 35mm film at a gas station in Havana, Cuba this past April 2019. I have my own identity struggles that come from a strained relationship with my mother and found this image to be very moving to me as I have often sought after a solid female role model in my life. I create photographic work that transcends time and opens a broader understanding of human relationships by placing myself as an outsider; in this case within the admiration that a daughter has for her mother, the visual strength of a woman on a motorcycle, the woman as provider and the notion that there is nothing but hope in trust and love.

Jennifer Johnson is a multidisciplinary artist that currently resides in Miami, FL. Her photography is rooted in the spontaneity of the streets and in the rich narratives that traveling and seeking truths have allowed her. Jennifer's practice is in analogue photography, both 35mm & 120mm and her social/documentary work is also rooted in a romanticism for film that came from having received her first camera from her grandfather many moons ago. Her practice is one of impromptu portraits, standstill poetry and optimism. Jennifer graduated from the School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University and applies her diplomatic understanding to her artistic practice.

My interests now are in learning, discovering and experimenting in themes that relate to sci-fi, futurism and our world today. I use vintage textiles, photography, pyrography and collage to build the work.



Joshua Levine

I am a leopard headed artist trying to make his way and stalk his prey in the city of LA.

Joshua Levine holds a BFA from The School of the Art Institute of Chicago and a MFA in sculpture from the University of Miami. Francesco Lo Castro makes use of historically grounding visual elements, reminiscent of Italian Futurism, 1980's analog computer graphics, Post-restoration Art Deco color palettes, Op Art, and Finish Fetish.

At its center lies a drive to recollect and arrest memories, marked by displacement and loss, as well as a future-forward aesthetic that dares to question the boundaries of biology and technology, the physical and the virtual, charting a holistic, common space within the increasingly fluid perimeters that are shaping contemporary culture.

A heightened sense of dimension and depth emerges through the use of unorthodox painting techniques that involve the intricate layering of pigment and plastics. What at first glance appears to be the result of countless hours spent with graphic design software is revealed upon closer examination to be meticulously handcrafted combinations of media, including acrylic, spray enamel, stone, and epoxies, applied on varied surfaces. Dense with movement while deliberately balancing explosiveness and strict order, vibrancy and dreaminess, power and release, a delicate and soothing broader vision emerges, summoning an oeuvre of subtle focus on healthcare and restoration.






Miralda





Stuart Sheldon is best known for his meticulous collage paintings and large-scale, immersive installations with themes exploring language, classic literature and social justice. His 2018 billboard, How Was School Today?, appeared on I-95 for two months as part of For Freedoms' 50 State Initiative and will be featured in an exhibition and town hall discussion at PAMM November 7, 2019. Sheldon won a 2108 Ellies Creator Award from Oolite Arts, honoring "the backbone of Miami's visual arts community." His work has been featured at re:publica Berlin, Apollinaire Fine Arts London, MOCA, North Miami, Art Miami, SCOPE and Pinta. Sheldon's paintings have been commissioned by the Braman family, Royal Caribbean Cruises and For Freedoms. As a 2018 ProjectArt artist-in-residence, Sheldon taught art to children in an underserved Miami public library. He created and hosted the public television project, Meet Your Makers, in collaboration with PBS and The New Tropic; it aired at PAMM in 2017. His 2015 Fancy Nasty installation was deemed "Miami's Wierdest Place" by Bas Fisher Invitational's Weird Miami Bus Tour. Sheldon cofounded Streaming Media Magazine in San Francisco and pens thoughts on art, humor and life in his Family Matters column for the Biscayne Times. The Los Angeles Times wrote, "To him, it's about urging people 'at a granular level' to start over, with less fear and more optimism."

Shuldiner meticulously bends, scrapes and sculpts his proprietary black material, creating mysterious areas both smooth and rough that proportionately reflect, refract, distort and absorb observable levels of electromagnetic radiation. A native new yorker, Gabriel J. Shuldiner was born and raised in Manhattan, New York City. He holds a Bachelor of Arts in Business and Philosophy from New York University and a Master of Fine Arts in Painting and Sculpture from Parsons the New School for Design. He has previously studied at the School of Visual Arts and International Center for Photography. Upon graduating from Parsons, Gabriel J. Shuldiner was selected by the Bronx Museum of the Arts 'Artist in the Marketplace' emerging artist program, and the Elizabeth Foundation for the Arts studio residency program, where he spent several years. Gabriel J. Shuldiner's self-described "bruteminimalist®" work has been exhibited nationally and internationally at select galleries, museums, institutions and avant-garde boutiques. He lives and works in Manhattan's West Chelsea, where he currently maintains his studio.

Ocean Loop, a recent exhibition lead Tommerup to a series of experiments that have something of the flavor of postwar avantgarde movements like Gutai, Arte Povera and Conceptual Art. Tommerup attached small oil paintings of the sea to a string and immersed them in the ocean. Some broke free and disappeared. She was able to reel others back in, battered and discolored by salt and water. Tommerup repeated the experiment with squares of raw canvas, and after retrieving them, sewed their water stained remains together. She grew salt crystals on paintings. She treated raw canvas with blue dye and salt water to create a surface that suggests the patterns that dance just below the skin of rippling water.

Mette Tommerup (Born 1969) is a painter, installation and performance artist based in Miami, FL. Originally from Denmark, Tommerup received a BFA from Indiana University of Pennsylvania (1990) and a MFA from School of Visual Arts, NYC (1995). Tommerup taught painting at Florida International University, Miami for many years and is currently a national reviewer for The National Youngarts Foundation. Her work can be found in numerous museum collections in Miami including The Frost Art Museum FIU, The Lowe Art Museum and Perez Art Museum Miami. Tommerup has completed several site specific installations for Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines and her work can be found in many private collections nationally and internationally. Awards include the Hassam, Speicher, Betts and Symons Purchase Fund at the American Academy of Arts and Letters, NYC 2010.

Since 1995 Tom Virgin has been building community around classrooms and printing presses. His life has been roughly split between teaching and learning. He is part of a community that brings young people and older experienced people together, to prepare each other to face the "real world." Visual art is the core system of communication skills he passes along, but he also encourages reading, speaking in public, and research as methods of grounding the communication in factual evidence. Most of his work involves prints, book arts, installations and public art. 
