


Image: Still from The Language Must Not Sweat

Locust Projects is proud to present *The Language Must Not Sweat*, by artist and filmmaker Shikeith. This is Shikeith's first solo exhibition in Miami and is the first time this work has been shown publicly. The exhibition will open with a public reception on Thursday, April 18, 2019 from 6:30-8:30pm.


The Language Must Not Sweat, a five-channel video installation titled after an expression Toni Morrison used in a 1981 interview, mines what puddles at the core of the public and subconscious lives of black men. This immersive-installation ponders the symbolic moisture of blackness at the intersections of gueerness and masculinity.

Inside the installation, suspended video projections of blue-black, fleshed bodies drenched in sweat beads, cycle through stages of flutter, stretch, exertion, and contemplation.

Placed among the videos, the artist uses elements such as water, heat, and soil to render a psychic landscape or 'blue space' that expresses an alternative orientation for black queer men in relation to the world around them. The form of the space is unstable, yet encourages the act or instance of wandering both of a bodily and psychic level.

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### **About the Artist**

Shikeith (born Philadelphia, PA 1989) is a multifarious artist. He received his BA from The Pennsylvania State University, University Park, PA for Integrative Art (2010) and his MFA in Sculpture from The Yale School of Art, New Haven, CT (2018). He maintains overlapping practices as an internationally exhibiting visual artist (past projects include: MoMA, Seattle Art Museum, MAK Gallery, London, Wroclaw Contemporary Museum, Poland), film director (selected works: #Blackmendream, A Drop of Sun Under The Earth). He is also currently an adjunct professor at Carnegie Mellon University's School of Art in Pittsburgh.

Recent and upcoming institutional solo shows: *Notes Towards Becoming A Spill*, Atlanta Contemporary (March-April 2019): 'Imagining Flesh Through Shadows,' Alexander Brest Museum & Gallery at Jacksonville University in Jacksonville, Florida (October 2019).

The artist's work attempts an assemblage of personal truths and wonder that focuses on the metamorphoses of Black men, especially within a society that denies these men their erotic

and reconciliatory potential and capital. It is the interior he considers—his own, as well as, other Black men or masculine people through emphasizing portraiture, sculpture, and film making to examine the fantastic as it relates and complicates personal autobiography and self-making.
